

Dear Mrs. Caviness,

I enjoyed your letter very much and much appreciate receiving the genealogical information. Since writing the letter to Harold, I have been checking through the Iowa census records and had discovered Alfred and Kirby and was wondering what the relationship was. With your information I have been able to deduce that the mother of Alfred and Kirby's wifes was living with Alfred in 1860 -- her name being Rachel Osburn and was 70 at that time (if Alfred gave the census taker the correct information). She was also born in North C. Also since writing your son, my mother put me in contact with a Mrs. Leigh C. Anderson, 1120 Lincoln Ave., Ann Arbor, Mich., a descendant of Alfred who apparently has a lot of information which includes all the material gathered up by a Dr. Leon Caviness -- also a descendant of Alfred and now deceased. You may be acquainted with these people as that may be the original source of your information. I received a lengthy letter from her a few days after receiving yours. She says her plans include assembling the information she has in three-hole folder form and then leaving it to each line of the family to add to it as much as they wished to do. She is interested in getting additional information on the Iowa members of the Cavingss family and checking the accuracy of the data that she has on the Kirby part. I intend to write her and tell her that I will attempt to provide her with this information but will have depend people like yourself to obtain it.

My father and mother have retired on their farm south of Mount Ayr and will be celebrating their fiftieth wedding anniversary April 25. Their names are Mark and Ilah Elliott and she is a granddaughter of Rachel. Dear Mr. Caviness,

I have undertaken tracing some of my family genealogy and quite interested in finding out more about the Caviness branch. My great grandmother Rachel Melinda Caviness (wife of Hosea Long) was the daughter of Kirpy and Esther Caviness. I have a minimum amount of information. According to the information I have, Kirby and Esther were born in North Carolina, at least he was a descendant of the French Hugenots, resided ahwhile in Plainfield, Ind., as Rachel was born there in 1840, and moved to Jefferson County, Iowa, about 1850. Also that Rachel had a sister,—a Mrs. A. J. Smith of Ames, and a brother—J. S. that resided in Greenfield.

I am wondering if you are a descendant of J. S. and, if you are, if you could provide me with additional biographical information on your family or put me in contact with any other member of your family that is interested and may have recorded some of the Caviness genealogy. It would be helpful to me if I could find out when Kirby and Esther died (within 5 or 10 years) and where they were buried.
