Martin first appears in 1556, then in 1556-57, and during the same year is referred to as brother of Robert of Redheuch. In 1561 he is called of Redheuch. In 1563 he is mentioned as of Braidlie, by which designation he was afterwards generally known. In 1569 he was pledge for the branch of Redheuch. In 1580 we hear of his sons, Sym, Gawin, Arche, and Hob, and at an earlier period, 1578, of another, William. Martin's son Gawin does not afterwards appear; Arche and Hob are again mentioned. In 1586 Martin Elliot and his eldest son, Simon, had a lease of lands from the Earl of Bothwell; in 1591 they had a Crown charter of Phillop in Selkirkshire, and Braidlie and Phillop were in the possession of the descendants of Martin about the time of the Restoration.

There was a certain Dand Elliot of Braidley mentioned in 1569 and subsequent years, who was not a son of Martin's.¹ He may perhaps be the Andrew Elliot who in 1541 held Braidley in Liddesdale along with others. (See Rental of Liddesdale in *Scotts of Buccleuch*, ii. 171.)


Archie, Gib, and Dandie Elliot, brothers' sons to Martin, are mentioned in 1580. Gib had been previously mentioned in 1569 when, though only a brother's son, he is called *Martin's Gib*. His brother Dandie may possibly be the Dand of Braidley referred to above, about whom another conjecture has been hazarded.

THE FAMILY OF BRAIDLEY.

MARTIN ELLIOT of Braidley, son of Robert of Redheugh No. IV., first mentioned in 1556. In 1561 called of Redheugh, and in 1563 of Braidley. In 1586 had lease of lands from Bothwell. In 1592 obtained charter to himself and his eldest son Simon of the lands of Phillop. Was alive in 1603.

Braidley After the family of Stewart of Doune received the keepership of the castle, and both before and after it was granted heritably along with the peerage of Doune, the castle was frequently used as a State prison. On the 1st of September 1567, the Privy Council directed Oliver Sinclair of Whitekirk, and William Newton of Newton, to enter their persons in ward within the castle of Doune in Menteith, within three days, and to remain there at their own cost until relieved.¹ On the 31st of August 1569, the Lords of Council discovered that two prisoners Robert Ellot, alias Clement Hob, in Gorumbery, and Archibald Ellot, alias Archie Kene, who had been ordered to enter themselves in ward in the Castle of Doune, and remain there until relieved, without attempting to escape, had not only made their escape, but

stood the tower of the Elliots of Goranberry, whose importance in the clan may be measured by the circumstance of their having had a supernatural ally to themselves. The Brownie of Goranberry still lives in tradition, and is said never to have failed the family in faithful service, till its last member had been gathered to his fathers. Disdaining no toil, however servile, doing many a busy night's work in silence under the harvest-moon, the Brownie's chief duty lay in averting by timely warning the approach of danger. Mute at all other times, his voice was then heard like the sighing of the autumn wind, rising into shrieks and passionate wails when dread passed into certainty of woe.¹

There was a tower of Goranberry, near the proposed wind farm, but not put in report.

On 20th September, 1484,² Angus again executed a precept directed to "Walter Scot de Edschan, Radulpho Ker, fratri Wateri Ker de Cesfurd et Willielmo Elwaldo de goranbery" to infeft Robert Elwald of the Redheuch in the 20 merk lands of Over and Nether "Larrostane."

On 13th November, 1489,⁸ at "Calco," the earl directed a further precept to William Ker of "Mersyntoune Radulpho Ker de Primsyde louch, Wilielmo elwad de gouinbery et Wilelmo gledstanys" to infeft Robert Elwad of the "Redehuch" in the lands commonly called "redehuch," "layhauch," "hartsgarth," "caraschele," "dawmane," and "larostanys superior et inferior," lying in the lordship of "Lyddalisdale;" and on 13th June, 1497,⁴ in presence of Ninian Elwald, Robert Elwald, William Elwald, John Elwald, Andrew Elwald, John Crosar, Quyntin Crosar, John Grame, and George Forstar, sasine of all the foresaid

When **Robert Elwald** received land of **Redheugh**, a **William Elwald** had land of **Goranberry**. Goranberry is a very historical location to the Elwald-Ellot-Elliot family.


