ELIOT.

Hon. Robert Eliot was born in 1643 and is first mentioned 13 Jan. 1660. In 1662 he was appointed Constable for Strawberry Bank. He lived in Portsmouth, now Newcastle, N. H., Scarborough, Me., and on Gerrish's Island in his last days. Was selectman in Portsmouth in 1679 and 1680, and in Scarborough in 1682 and town's Deputy to General Court in 1685. In 1692 he was appointed one of the Councillors of New Hampshire and held that office with the exception of one year till 1715. Timothy Gerrish recorded in his family Bible: "My father-in-law, Robert Eliot, Dyed in 82 year of his age in March 24th 1724."

A court record, dated 29 May 1683, speaks of "Robert Eliot, who married the relict and administratrix of Ric. Young of Cape Porpus." He and wife Margery deeded land, 13 June 1687, to son-in-law, Emanuel Davis, and Mary his wife. This Mary was probably daughter of Richard and Margery (Batson) Young. In a Bill of Sale, dated 7 June 1692, Robert Eliot names "my wife whose maiden name was Margery Batson." She was daughter of Stephen Batson of Cape Porpoise, whose will names daughter Margery Young.

"The deposition of Robert Eliot, Esq., of full age Testifieth and Saith that some time in the ——— in the year 1689 he made an agreement with John Shepard, Senr., of Spruce Creek, about the ten acres of land which Corromack Ogada bought of Ephraim Crocket of sd Spruce Creek Deceased, which agreement was this. That sd Deponent was either to goe up myself or Send to run ye line between sd Shepard and sd Corromacks land afore Specified, which when done was to be a final end of all difference between sd Shepard and sd Corromack for sd ten acres of land. Accordingly I ye Deponent sent my Son Nathaniel Eliot up with Nicholas Heskins, Enoch Hutchins and Mr. William Godsoe, run ye line and laid out sd land of sd Corromacks as doth more fully appear by the draught of sd land given under sd Godsoes hand as Surveyr. And this was to be a finall end relating to sd land for ever and further ye sd Shepard did engage to stand to ye abovesd agreement, his heirs and assigns.

Reverend William Screven, while at Kittery, in a letter to the Baptist church in Boston dated September 13, 1682, mentions the fact that his mother-in-law (Mrs. **Champernowne**) had become a Baptist. After the death of Captain **Champernowne**, Mrs. **Champernowne**, with **Humphrey** Elliot and his family, removed to South Carolina and joined the Screvens, who went to South Carolina in 1684.

Robert Elliot, oldest son of **Humphrey** Elliot, married¹ (1), February 5, 1720-21, Elizabeth Screven, daughter of Reverend William and Bridget (Cutts) Screven. Robert Elliot resided in Berkley county South Carolina. He held the office of tax commissioner in 1720, and for several years following. His will, dated July 15, 1727, was proved January 11, 1727-28. His mother, Elizabeth (Cutts) Elliot, after the death of her husband, married Robert Witherick, of Somerton, South Carolina.¹ **Champernowne** Elliot signed his mother's bond in 1718, and is frequently mentioned in the records of South Carolina, 1720-25, as deputy to the surveyor general. “Captain Francis Champernowne was the ninth child and youngest son of Arthur Champernowne by his wife Bridget, daughter of Sir Thomas Fulford. He was born in the parish of Dartington, Devonshire, where he was baptised in October, 1614. He was a relative of Sir Humphrey Gilbert and Sir Walter Raleigh, whose mother was Katharine, sister of Sir Arthur Champernowne, the great-grandfather of Francis. He came to New England, and settled at Kittery, Maine. He died between November, 1686, and September 20th, 1687. His will is printed in the *New England Historical and Genealogical Register*, vol. xxvii. pp. 146–8. Mr. Tuttle contributed a series of articles on Francis Champernowne and his ancestry to the above-named periodical, vol. xxviii. pp. 75–82, 318–23, 403–9. He left in manuscript a work on The Life and Times of Captain Francis Champernowne, now in the possession of his widow, Mrs. Mary P. Tuttle, which it is hoped may before long be published.”

[DANIEL GOODWIN married, first, Margaret, daughter of Thomas Spencer of Kittery, Maine: secondly, Mrs. Sarah, daughter of John Sanders, and widow of Peter Turbet. After Turbet's death in 1661, she was courted by Robert Elliot, and this courtship was entered into with so much fervency and earnestness that the marriage was considered certain. Accordingly Elliot, as being the sure future husband of the widow, was appointed administrator on Turbet's estate. But the Court Records show that, in July, 1772. "Whereas "former administration was granted Robert Elliot "on Peter Turbet's estate, deceased, in relation to "his marrying the said Turbet's widow, which he "not doing, the said administration is null, and "this Court, from the desire of said Peter Turbet's "widow, grants administration to his son John."

In 1679, Daniel Goodwin, planter, conveyed land to his daughter, Mrs Daniel Stone, and also to his son, Daniel. In 1683, he conveyed land, in the parish of Berwick, town of Kittery, Maine, to his sons, Thomas and James. In 1797, he con-
