Hon. Robert Eliot was born in 1643 and is first mentioned 13 her families Jan. 1660. In 1662 he was appointed Constable for Strawberry By Everett Bank. He lived in Portsmouth, now Newcastle, N. H., Scar-Schermerhorn borough, Me., and on Gerrish's Island in his last days. selectman in Portsmouth in 1679 and 1680, and in Scarborough in 1682 and town's Deputy to General Court in 1685. In 1692 he was appointed one of the Councillors of New Hampshire and held that office with the exception of one year till 1715. Timothy Gerrish recorded in his family Bible: "My father-in-law, Robert Eliot, Dved in 82 year of his age in March 24th 1724."

A court record, dated 20 May 1683, speaks of "Robert Eliot, who married the relict and administratrix of Ric. Young of Cape Porpus." He and wife Margery deeded land, 13 June 1687, to son-in-law, Emanuel Davis, and Mary his wife. This Mary was probably daughter of Richard and Margery (Batson) Young. In a Bill of Sale, dated 7 June 1692, Robert Eliot names "my wife whose maiden name was Margery Batson." She was daughter of Stephen Batson of Cape Porpoise, whose will names daughter Margery Young.



This John appears to have been his only son according to his will March 8, 1674, but he mentions daughters Margery wife of Rowland Young; Mary Brookhouse (or Backus, as now spelled) and grandchild John Trott. John married, 1660, Elizabeth, daughter John Saunders, of Wells; was representative to the general assembly at York, 1682-4. He or a son of the same name deeded land at Cape Porpoise to John Fairfield, including a mill privilege on Middle river, Arundel, March 21, 1723; and a John Batson was a ship-builder in 1728 at Wells. Beyond this we have no record of the family. It seems certain that Stephen Batson and Thomas Baston, mentioned below, were of the same family. With a mark contraction over the final o, Captain Bonito may stand for Richard Bonython, or Bonighton, of Saco, and a magistrate there in 1636; and it may be inferred that Margery Batman brought from Saco by Henry Lawrence in 1638 — was claimed by Captain Bonython as his servant by prior indenture or agreement.

There was a Stephen Batson at Saco in 1636, who had a daughter Margery: he removed to Cape Porpus in 1653 (Folsom, History of Saco, pp. 33, 124). 

XIII. ELIZABETH CUTT, daughter of Robert and Mary (Hoel) Cutt, married Humphrey Elliot before July 13, 1685; her step-father, Francis Champernowne, gave at that date a deed of land to "Elizabeth Elliot, daughter of Mary, my beloved wife," etc. Her son, Champernowne Elliot, is mentioned in her step-father's will made Nov. 16, 1686. Her husband is thought to have been a son of Robert Elliot of colonial fame, by his first wife, Margery Batson. Some have doubted this, but it seems to be a reasonable conclusion. Mr. and Mrs. Elliot removed to South Carolina, at or about the same time that their brother-in-law, Rev. Wm. Screven, went on account of persecution. After the death of her husband Mrs. Elliot married again, her second husband being Thomas Witherick. It is not known whether her son Champernowne was married or not. He is mentioned in the 3d volume of the Statutes at large of

Tough some feel that Robert Witherick is Mrs. Elliot first husband after Humphrey, it is felt he is actually the second husband after Thomas Witherick, likely a brother to Robert.

It is felt when Humphrey died he left his wife with child. She end up marrying Thomas Witherick, and they named that child after Thomas Witherick, but preferred the name Thomas over Witherick as a first name, unlike using Champernowne. So Champernowne does have a younger brother named Thomas, and Humphrey and Elizabeth have two sons, not Robert and Champernowne, but Champernowne and Thomas.





#### "Elizabeth Witherick, widow $T_0$

Ann Elliott, wife of Thos. Elliott Sr. Deed of Gift 2 July 1729 of 100 acres in Berkely Co. 'in consideration of love I bear my sister said Ann Elliott." Whether Thomas Elliott and Humphrey were brothers may be inferred from this document as above expressed. The descendants of Thomas are numerous. Of the family of Humphrey and Elizabeth Elliott very little indeed is known save that they had two sons and perhaps other children. Mrs. Elliott was living as late as 1729 (then Mrs. Witherick) having become a second time a widow. All known descendants are through her son Robert, who is supposed to have been the Robert who married Elizabeth Screven, in which case it was a marriage of cousins, so common at that The Elliots of South Carolina and adjacent states have always been a distinguished family, and it is to be hoped that some day some antiquarian can unravel their family line and give the students of family history a volume worthy of their achievements and fame.

CUTT.

In 1640, one William Cutts was taxed in Saco, Maine. In 1657, John Cutt is first mentioned, as one of the five "selectmen," of Portsmouth. In 1646, Richard Cutt succeeded Sampson Lane in the occupation of what was then known as the "great house," which was built in 1631. It is probable that John, Richard and Robert Cutt came from England to this country prior to 1646. Robert Cutt first went to Barbadoes, afterwards to Portsmouth, living at "Great Island" now known as New Castle. He removed from that place to Kittery, Maine.

Richard Cutt was first a resident of the Isles of Shoals and later removed to Portsmouth. There lived, too, at Portsmouth one John Cutt, Jr., who was probably a nephew of the three brothers. Besides these seven of the name, there was also a sister, Ann Cutt, who married John Skipway, a merchant of Portsmouth.

The earlier record of the family gives the spelling Cutt. It

Ann Cutt recorded as the third marriage to Thomas Elliot which make her Ann Elliot is the sister to Elizabeth Cutt which is known as Elizabeth Witherick.
