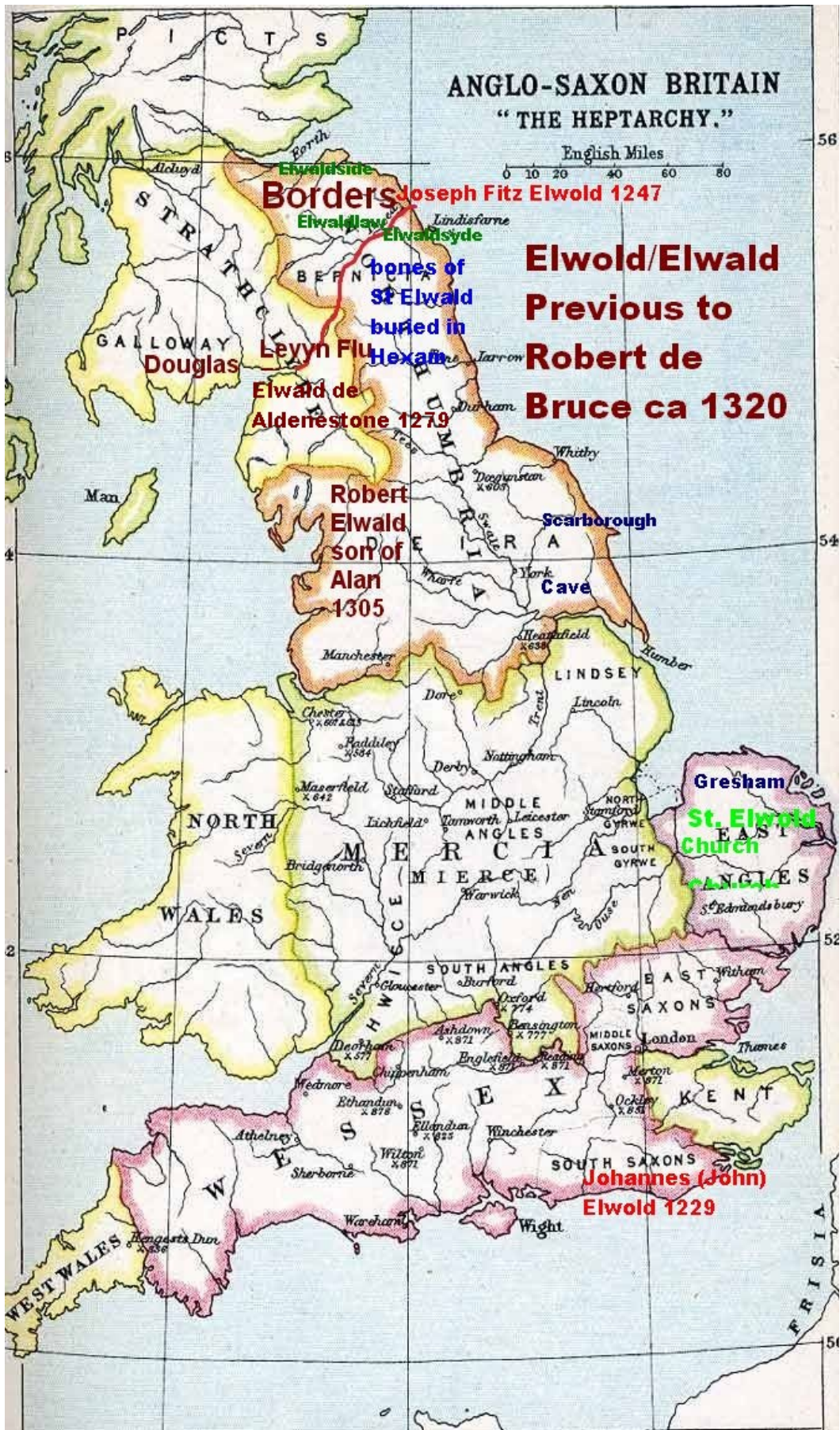

sive name of Unkutheman (unco' man). Cecilia, the wife of John Unkutheman of Newbrough, destroyed herself, when pregnant, in her own chamber, with a certain razor. The holders of this unlucky name appear to have been unfortunate. William Unkutheman and Elwald de Aldenestone were making a certain dam or fence (*sepem*) in the water of Tyne. And the said William was striking upon a certain stake with a certain mallet, to drive it into the ground, when the head of the mallet flew off, and striking Elwald on the head, deprived him of life. Poor William Unkutheman was taken up and imprisoned for the homicide; but a verdict of accidental death was returned, "et concessa est ei pax," (and peace was conceded to him), says the record.

Above in 1279 the name Elwald in Tynedale (in Northumberland) was a personal name, and at that time was not a surname, but in Rye in 1229 Elwood was used as a surname.

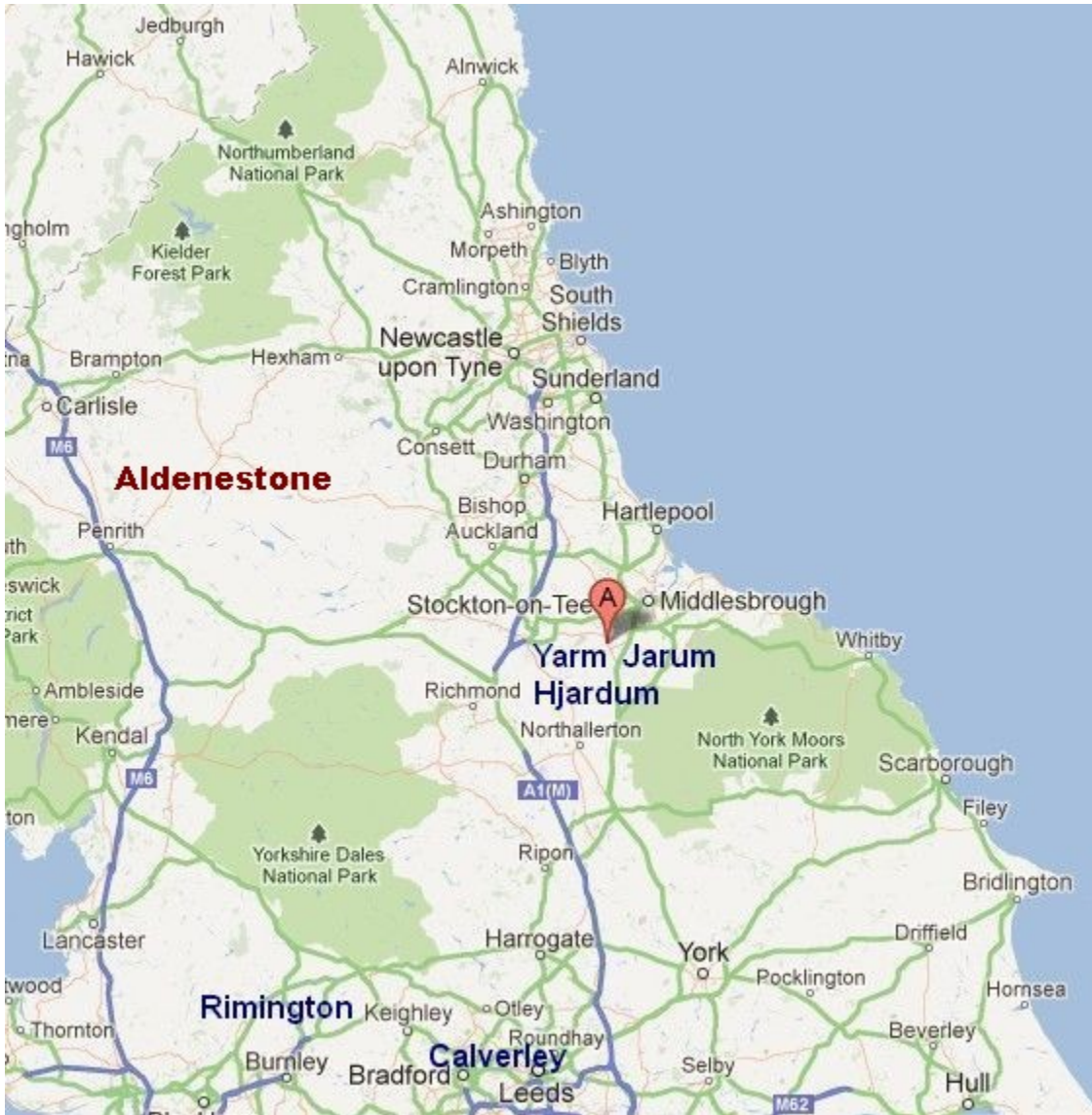

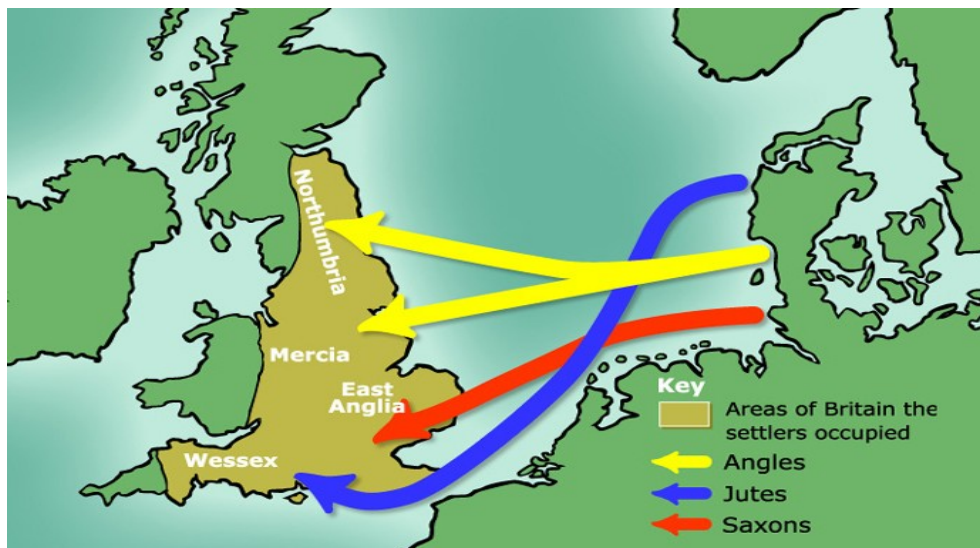

It is felt that by the time of Robert de Bruce all people did not have surnames, and the use of surnames basically travel north.

Among the names of Elwald found in Northumbria, the names which were utilized in Redheugh; Robert, John, and William are of common use. The names Ninian, and Andrew are saintly names. When the pope visited Scotland it was on St Ninian Fiesta Day, and the Scots where waving the flag with St Andrew's cross on it.

It is felt that John Elwald, rector of St. Andrews University in 1418, who with help of Bothwell (a Douglas) ca 1420 became a Canon of Glasgow (Shelkirk), the by 1423 in the Baronie of Kirkandrews of the Douglas, in the Parish of Kirkandrews became the rector, Abby of (St Ninian) of Whitethorne. This is why it is felt for Robert of Redheugh, the names Ninian and Andrew (alias Dand) were used. It is felt that through many sons, who became bailee (lawyers), clerk (accountants) of the Lariston branch John Elwald rector of St Andrews in their past may have had an influence.

After the stories of King Arthur, the name from Elwald became Elliot, of Sir Lancelot, and Camellot. With Gawaine a hero from the north son of Lot. Lot is archaic northern United Kingdon word for grove, it is a term used today in plats. So Lancelot (Lance and old Armstrong name), mean a lance (spear) traveling through the wood (woods).

At the time the border was realigned, by Robert de Bruce with assistance of the Douglas, in which the Elwald surname fought for, those who were considered Scottish, could be made English, and those who were considered English could be made Scottish. By changing the border changing ones affiliation happens to this day.

It is felt that this splitting happened to a lot of clans. Some may have be said to be English traitors because they resettled in Scotland, and that did not have at all. They stayed in the same place an the border crossed over them.

The Elwald which became Elliot were on the Scottish side of this 1320 border. Given that the Douglas of Caver, and the Walter Scott clan, along with the Redheugh Elwald and the Mangerton Armstrongs, were considered to be Traitors of Leven, an said to be of the Leven Flu which is of the Kirkandrews Parish, and that it is felt they were at first the surname Elwald, of England, it is felt that the surname was past on in this region of Kirkandrews, and the Leven Flu, and Y-DNA was past back to the Elwald which did not always sustain a male line.

It if felt though coming first out of Northumbria, of the Scottish Elliot it is from this region, though little of the anglo-saxon Y-DNA may remain.

It is also felt that the Scott, Graham, Crozier, like the Elwald could at one time be considered English, but in resettling among the Scots, they pasted on their surname were the Scots past on their Y-DNA.
