Rec'd letters 0.K. & do forgive me Lucia for neglecting to answer the 1st one. But I got it in the afternoon that Elliotts mother was married and after I was so busy & have had so much company ever since. But Elliott hasn't had time to pack the typewriter until today & he packed it & sent it. By freight, I am sending the way bill. Elliott has been on 81 & 82 to Clinton Iowa & that is such a hard job that it seemed when he was home he was in bed. They put him on the mine pool on Sunday so he is home more. He is in bed now expecting a call anytime.

I will send that "Forget It" that Elliott brought home . I got it copied off. How is Mary? Did she have the influenza? Robert and I had it. I didn't have it very bad but was in bed 9 days. But it took me a month ti gain my strength back. I had the carpet out of my bedroom everything tore up Maude Riley come down to help me clean house took my curtains down & washed them on Monday and she took her bed Monday P.M. about 1:30 we called the doctor about 4:P.M. & then after I had set up with her all Monday night Hardly left her bed all night long. The Dr. came out Tues. A.M. & said he would take her to the Hospital. Then I started to take it Tues. night & had the Dr. Wed. night. Then Elliott had to lay off for about ten days Lost about \$75.00 A high priced nurse I had.

We papered, painted the floors and varnished the woodwork in bedroom this fall. And I painted the floors of the front room and dining room. Just got my house cleaned in time for the wedding. Yes, Lucia, we done the best we could for Elliotts Mother. I know she appreciated it & we certainly enjoyed doing it & I feel now that we have paid her back for what she done for us when we were married. I think she has a fine man. He seems to be & they seem so happy. Just so it continues so & I think it will. Robert and sister are well only colds. I wish you could see them They are a mischievious pair now. Sister talks everything. Sister Sadie is here with me now. She has very poor health & had to take a leave from the Tel. office. She is getting better. It is her stomach and nerves.

Well, Lucia you didn't get to come on your vacation this summer. When are you coming out. You must come now as it will seem so nice to go to Elliotts' mothers & and seem something like it used to be, in her own home. How is Aunt Martha? Give her and Vira & the rest my Best Regards. Hoping this finds you well -

If I had known it was going to blizzard I would have had this ready for him to mail this morning, altho he leaves the house about 7.30 - I am very sorry Aunt Martha had to endure pain and suffering the last years of her long and useful life. I was thinking of her the other day and thought she must have passed away before this, as I never heard any news of her. The last time I heard from her was from Lizzie, was Aunt Martha was failing and it was difficult for her to answer letters. I was surprised to hear of her death, also, she had remembered Alice in her will. I know both Alice and Ray will appreciate it. I am sorry the storm stopped you from coming to Hudson but there are pleasant days ahead. I will close with remembrance to all from
