Dear sister and brothers

Well here we are enjoying this pleasant weather. We have only had one rainy day since we have been here and that was the 23 of Jan the day George Adams was burried that was Burn Cole son-in-law. They live down at Long Beach. He died with apoplexy. There is a shower tonight too. The people that live here are wanting rain have not had enough vet.

There is lots of Orange Groves around here John and I were out this eve and picked an orange off a tree just across the street here at Rebecca Andersons. The man has been out here eregating all day & we were out watching him. Say but this is a nice place to live. It is nice to get out of that cold winter.

We were at Pomona Wednesday and Thursday last week. And there is lots of Walnut groves down there. McClintock sold a ton of walnuts from five acres at 23¢ a pound besides the fruit on the place and 1200 hens. That place was sold for \$12000, McClintocks rented it she was awfull sorry there is a nice new Bungalow on it this fall. don't have to lift a thing Tubs stationary draw hot and cold water & let it all off. bathroom two bedrooms dining room and sitting room & kitchen & a enclosed porch. Water to erigate and gas - all complete chickens went with the place. the man is from Prince Ville Ill that bought the place. Some day these groves will be sold out for lots and a lot sells some of them \$1500. He got 24 doz eggs last Wednesday night, 55¢ per doz.

There is car after car travling through looking for places camping out out fits with them tied on the car.

Becca brought the walnuts in so I just had to quit writing awhile. Henry Streed is here too so we are enjoying a good visit with him too. He was discharged from the army the 21 of Jan. He was in the service 18 months in Siberia and Russia.

We visited McClintocks at Pomona I like that place. Los Angeles is too large. We can't get anywhere alone. We saw Nellie and Bert Hendershott & Edith. Went to Long Beach and seen Coles & the girls there and when we got there Phill and Mary Ellen Ruch was there. They rented a house all ready furnished for \$60 per month and Coles folks were paying \$50 a month & furnished it. Lived in a department house and renting them.

People are coming fast here to live But a person don't need much land if you take care of it yourself. Down in Los A. I seen lots add for \$1000 a lot.

We make our stoping place at Talbotts. Sallie is so weak minded & forgetfull and is pretty hard to get along with. Al and his wife is there They have moved from Brooklyn are going to buy in Los Angeles. So we eat at Basis & sleep at Charlies just across the street. We want to get a room somewhere in Pomona if we don't go to Redondo Beach at Basis summer house, I would like to go there. We have been down there to see the place it is fine. If you write direct to 1417 Calumet Ave, Los Angeles Cal. that is at B.M. Talbott. They will know where we are & we can get it. I would just love to be down to the Beach awhile.

Well, how are you all getting along How is Phebe. I believe I would like to buy a place here some where if the rest of the folks were here & and you folks were all here too. People are coming from all parts of the United States & why can't we. Well, this will have to do for all of you for I don't get much time to write. Rufus has had a stroke & he is helpless so Becca is tied down awfull close.

We are going to Atascadero before we go home and see that country and see Mary Howard. They have their place paid for now she said. Marthas daughter lives at Berkley but it is across a lake or something I don't know if we will get to see her or not. It is hard to get places when it is strange to us.

There is a Baptist church in Pomona. Oh I just wish you were here to see this country. That would be better that telling you. Well it is bed time and I must close Love to all

Your kind letter received and read with pleasure. Glad to hear you are all well. I would love to see you all but I believe I want to see the Baby the worst of all. Kiss her for me. I know she is getting to be a cute thing by now. Well, I guess you have cold weather up there by now. It blew up quite a cold wind here last night but not cold enough to hurt anything. Everything is green and pretty here, so many flowers in bloom, the bananas and palms, and canes are beautiful, they are so tall.

Well, Mr. Hendricks is very busy with his school work all the time, but he is enjoying it. He seems to be improving all the time, eats better and sleeps better than he did at home. We can get anything to eat here we want, that is as long as we can pay for it. We like New Orleans fine so far. Tell Bill that Davys Campbells' daughter, Lala, is here in school, preparing to be a missionary. She was so surprised to find us here. They are here from everywhere. They have students here from 19 states and seven foreign countries, all nationalities. Sixty married couples I can't say how many children but lots of them. We are in a house with ten other couples, but we all have our own apartments separate, we have only one little child in this house. There is one house here that has thirty children in it. There are about the same number of families as this house.

Well, we had a letter from John Hendricks, Lums' boy, this week. He said they are all well. We hear from Marble Hill often, they say they miss us, but say things are going fine at school.

Henry, Mr. Hendricks says to tell Berniece to take two years of Latin, by all means. Tell her not to go and get married before she finishes school. Ha-ha. Give Bernice and Martha and all our love. I will close for this time with love and best wishes for all.

Dear Aunt Lucia,

We had expected to write you more but we didn't get to see Aunt Clara until last Tuesday. She was getting along quite well. She looked better we tho't but she was not getting up. The nurses did not put her stockings on her and it was too cool without them on.

She asked to go home and I told her she couldn't go home there was no one there who could take care of her, and she said maybe Lucile would come take care of her. Then she said will you take me home with you next time you come if I get up and walk around some. But she don't get around any. I imagine she doesn't feel much like getting up or she surely would.

I wanted to move her to this place as soon as I heard about it as it won't be so far for Clifford or us or as expensive. As the Dr. goes to see her at the hospital twice a week if she needs him or not. Costs the boys \$5.00 a week. Then Clifford payed a \$2.00 laundry bill. I don't know what it was for. I think they just put that over on him because he was green.

Clifford is moving her Wed. P.M. to (501 W. Division St., Galva, Ill. care of Mrs. Mary Carmen) It is a private home. The woman was a trained nurse and has quite a large house, and has two daughters at home. She has 6 or 7 old ladies already and had just one empty bed. Mrs. Walker the "old folks pensioner" asked Mrs. Carmen to hold that bed until she heard from us. She has three single beds in what was her front room and bedroom. She takes them for their pension.

They took Uncle Windfield and Aunt Anna there when they both got so bad. But Uncle Windfield died in a few days then Aunt Anna came back and Minas' Mary (Mrs. Larue) and little boy are keeping house for Aunt Anna in their little home here in town.

I do hope Aunt Clara will be satisfied here at this place. It will be more like a home. One woman has been there over a year.

We have been having revival meetings the last two weeks. The evangelist was sure fine. I could hardly stay away and I could hardly stand going every night. I missed 4 meetings, I think. And we had our pastor and wife and the evangelist here for dinner on Fri. We didn't have but 2 or 3 conversions but quite a few backsliders were accepted. Some had been members of the Christian Church.

The meetings were most beneficial to the members themselves.

I must go to bed as I can hardly see, I am so tired. I washed and churned today and must bake bread and iron tomorrow. Must do some cleaning soon.

Well if Owen goes up town he can take it up I felt awfull bad about it. Well you don't know how many times I thought of you nor I dom't either It is a very nice day Edna had her class party here last night so many sick couldn't come Alice was up But was here about 9 or 10 here Stella and Mrs Plunket across the street from Maymies served with her. So she worked so hard this week everything so dirty this time of year she hired a woman one day got the downstairs cleaned looked better. Went to Galesburg got new curtains for the sitting room washed the dining room ones and ironed them We need papering but it won't get it this time.

Well Henry we are all upset here and feel so bad Owen was called to Kewanee a week ago last Wednesday to talk about going to Camp He hasn't been examined yet but to get his business fixed up by September that he would have to go.

We don't know where we could get anyone that could stay with us while he is gone Dave has his job at the Arsnell Stewart has his place and wants to keep it they are taking all the Boys in our country and giving all older men such good work what are they going to do with the farms Ivan Anderson over here on John McCurdy farm has to go Shirley was over here last night was worrying about it don't know what we are going to do You know when war is over and when the Boys come home there is nothing to do everything goes to pieces no prices It is awfull hard now to keep things together. We had no luck this year with our pigs some sows had 2 pigs. Owen lost one big old sow only had 4 pigs one of them died. He wanted to raise a lot of them. Clint Cole said he couldn't figure out what was the cause he had such poor luck this year. Owen had one sow that had 9 pigs. He had over 20 sows has six more to farrow has 38 Iguess.

I sneeze all the time take more cold change from one room to another I wanted to send for 2 or three brooms before they were all gone I hope you have 2 at least yet what are they selling at apiece Yes I saw Lou once out there somewhere I would like to see her again but I wasn't able to go

Edna wants to get some garden made as soon as she can Stella is getting along all right but she can't stand much can't lift and work any to speak of That is the way with myself if I didn't do anything I would feel better But I see so much could be done but am not able to do it and it is too much for Edna When you get old you have to let up or grunt and complain

I got Dads letter today and was surprised you haven't got my diploma. It's been 6 weeks since I've taken the test and you should have it by now. I'll have to go down to I and E tomorrow and find out what's the matter.

I got one of Moms letters the other day she sent me while I was at Ft. Lawton. She forgot to put Ft. Lawton on it so it took some time to get to me.

If you think it's hot at home you ought to be out here. Everything is brown or burnt up and they have to water the grass all the time to keep it growing. I had to do that all one day last week. It was easy work but it was tiresome.

I got a letter from Aunt Lucia and Dorothy this noon at mail call. Some days I don't get any so I was pretty lucky today.

There isn't much doing around here so there isn't hardly anything to write about. I went out to Castle Rock again yesterday. You don't have to do anything out there. You can go as you please as long as you got pants or swim trunks on. You can sleep all day and at nite they have a show out in the open.

I still don't know how soon I'll leave here yet. Men going to China have to wait a long time to be shipped so it's hard telling when I'll leave. I'll call you up as soon as I get alerted, tho.

I guess this is all for now cause there isn't hardly anything to write about.
